## French Club

The purpose of the French club is to increase interest in the language and hopefully gain further insight into the culture of French-speaking peoples. The French Club usually meets for dinner once a month and with special meetings for certain holidays. Anyone currently enrolled in a French class or who has completed a minimum of two years in French may become a member.

## Future Medical Professionals

Provides insight for students in 10-12th grade of different jobs in the medical field. Some activities that we participate in is an annual blood drive, angel tree, breast cancer awareness. Dues are \$5.

## Gastronomy Appreciation

To study the food and culture from different areas around the world. Must be in 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, or 12<sup>th</sup> Grades. Dues are \$5.

## Habitat for Humanity

The goal of Habitat for Humanity international is to eliminate poverty housing from the world. Habitat houses are built by volunteers with donated money and materials and are sold to approved low-income families at cost. The T.H.S. Chapter, which is affiliated with Northeast MS Habitat for Humanity and Habitat for Humanity International, provides an opportunity for students to actively respond to the need for decent housing in this area and around the world. Membership in the T.H.S. chapter is open to all students in grades 9-12. Students may participate in the actual construction of houses, in raising funds for Habitat projects, and in educating the student population about the work of Habitat. Dues are \$5.00.

## Hi-Times

Is composed of the newspaper staff. Members are selected each April based on a rubric including writing samples and teacher recommendations. They will be entering the 10th, 11th and 12th grades. There are no fees but each staff member must sell or attempt to sell with proof presented in the form of a signed business card, ads for the Hi times paper to be used for all production expenses. The group produces 8 newspapers a year, attends a fall workshop with MSPA at Ole Miss and competes at the state convention in April each year.

## HOSA (Health Occupations Students of America)

HOSA is a national organization for vocational students enrolled in a vocational health education program. Skills and knowledge gained through the Allied Health Technology program will provide a basis for competitive events on the district, state and national level. A few goals of HOSA are learning leadership skills, developing character, and building self-confidence. HOSA club members are involved in community service projects as well as chapter social activities. You must be enrolled in Allied Health Technology to participate in this club. The membership fee for HOSA is \$13.

## Humane Society's National Club for High Schools (formerly We Care About Animals-WCAA)

Everyone who is interested in the care of homeless and abused animals is encouraged to join We Care About Animals Club. The main projects are to raise money for the Animal Shelter and to aid the Senior Humane society in any way. Students volunteer on Saturdays at Petsmart assisting in animal adoption.

## IMPROV Club

Improv is open to any student in grades 10, 11, 12. No dues are required.

Improv Club is a chance for Theatre and non-Theatre students to come together to enjoy the art of improvisation. Students meet at the allotted time and are encouraged to participate and view various improv games. Improv teaches teamwork, good listening skills, and creativity.

## Interact Club

Is a community-service club sponsored by the Rotary Club of Tupelo. There are fun, meaningful service projects and activities that provide a chance to develop leadership skills and meet new people. Dues are \$10 for new and \$5 for returning members. Open to 10-12 graders.

## Junior Civitans

Junior Civitans is a service club. Its purpose is to train students to become better citizens by having them work on projects related to the home, school, community, and nation. During the year the students participate in fundraising projects for charitable organizations and in other projects that might benefit their school and community. Membership is open to anyone. Dues are \$15.00.

## Key Club

The Key Club is sponsored by the Tupelo Kiwanis Club. The Key Club is a scholastic and service honorary club for boys at THS. The Key Club is actively involved in school and community activities. It sets standards in scholarship, sportsmanship, and leadership. In addition, the Key Club promotes the building of lasting friendships as one of its main purposes. Membership is open to boys in grades 10, 11 and who maintain an overall 3.00 GPA. Membership to the Key Club is extended by invitation to those who qualify to become members.

## Mayor's Youth Council

Is a collaboration between the City of Tupelo, MS and Tupelo High School. This organization enriches students on how the government function on a city-wide level; while also allowing the voices of the city youth to be heard. MYC provides students with hands-on activities to ensure that they understand the protocol and hierarchy of working with political figures. MYC further provide students with volunteer opportunities All Students from 9th through 12th grade are encouraged to join.

Requirements:

1. Have little to minimal discipline infractions
2. Maintain at least a 2.0 G.P.A.
3. Attend school regularly
4. Attend scheduled events

## Mu Alpha Theta

Mu Alpha Theta is a National Math Club whose primary objective is to recognize and encourage mathematically gifted students. Programs include speakers who are involved in math oriented careers. Challenging contests to improve members' speed and reasoning abilities, are also a part of the clubs program.

## National Art Honor Society

Is the National Honor Organization for the Arts.

Members use their artistic talents to benefit the school and community and to promote the arts.

The philosophy of the organization to add beauty to their community through the use of their creative and artistic talents.

Projects have included "The Art Circus, large scale art for school offices, creating 40 paintings for the nursing home, setting up new studio space in C-building and design graphics for other schools and businesses.

Membership requirements are as follows:

Completion of an Art I or AP Art History with a B plus average.

Membership 10th through 12th grade.

Earning 10 honor points through participation in community and school arts projects.

Ten Dollar Membership dues for National and Local Chapter Dues.

In addition, this covers our charitable projects for the year.

## National Honor Society

The National Honor Society is an honorary organization designed to recognize outstanding achievements of high school students in the areas of scholarship, leadership, character, and service. Honor Society members in good standing wear an honor stole and tassel at graduation, and a gold seal of the society is affixed to their diplomas. Members are evaluated and may be dismissed from the organization at any time if they should violate one of the four basic tenets of the organization. Juniors who have maintained a cumulative 3.50 GPA at the end of the second semester of their sophomore year may apply for membership. They are then evaluated on the basis of leadership, character, and service. Those approved receive a certificate of membership when they are inducted into the society. Seniors who do not qualify their junior year may apply for membership at the end of their junior year.

## National Science Honor Society

NSHS will be the prominent scientific organization that will engender a new group of young thinkers who will be the future of industry, research, and scientific exploration. Membership for a student in the NSHS is conferred during the last two years of secondary school education. A student must have and maintain a 3.0 grade point average (4.0 scale) and a 3.5 in all science courses to be a member.

## National Spanish Honorary Society (Sociedad Honoraria Hispánica)

The purpose of this organization is to recognize high achievement in the study of Spanish and to promote a continuity of interest in Hispanic Studies. It is a national organization sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese. To qualify a student must meet the following criteria: (1) 10th-12th graders currently enrolled in Spanish; (2) Have an "A" average over three semesters in Spanish; (3) Maintain 3.5 minimum grade point average. The students are inducted into membership in a ceremony held during the second semester. There is a one-time membership fee of \$15.00.

There are no fees, per say, but the students usually take up a collection for a fall and/or spring banquet where by tradition the Madrigal singers perform. \$10.00.

## Skills USA

Skills USA is a national organization for boys and girls enrolled in vocational industrial education programs. Skills USA is the largest vocational youth organization in the nation. It has more than one million members. The goal of Skills USA is to help students with interest in the trade, industrial, technical, or health fields to become happy, mature, and productive citizens. Each year the Tupelo VICA club becomes involved in local and state competition with other vocational high schools. Some local students advance to national competition representing their trade areas each year. In addition, other local activities are planned throughout the year. Any student enrolled in a vocational course is eligible to become a member. Open to any student who is enrolled in a career and technical class. Dues are set by the state.
